The Treason Act – 17 July 1649

Tuesday 17th July was a busy day in Parliament. Along with the previously noted Act defining the denominations, weights, and designs of the new Commonwealth coinage, (1) an act was also passed declaring what offences shall be adjudged treason.

The Treasons Act of 1649 was passed by the so-called Rump Parliament. It superseded the Act declaring what offences shall be adjudged Treason passed about two months earlier on the 14th of May 1649. The Rump Parliament was part of the Long Parliament in Britain that continued to sit after the forced exclusion of Presbyterian members in 1648. It voted for the trial that resulted in the execution of Charles I.

With the execution of Charles I at the end of January in 1649, new Treason Acts were necessary to replace those that had previously addressed offences against the King, with those that addressed threats that faced the Commonwealth.

This Treason Act of 17th July 1649 is just five pages long, but the last page and a half refer to all aspects of the circulating gold and silver coinage. The whole Act is reproduced in the pages that follow and a brief summary appears below.

The Act proceeds as follows. On pages 353-4, that no one is to publish or say that the [Commonwealth] government is tyrannical, usurped, or unlawful, or that the commons in parliament assembled are not the supreme authority of this nation. Then no members of the Commonwealth's army (under Thomas Fairfax) are to plot, contrive, or endeavour to stir up or raise force against the present government, or for the subversion or alteration of the same. Then page 355 begins; no one is to procure, invite, aid, or assist any foreigners or strangers to invade England or Ireland or to attempt or incite the subversion of the government, or insurrection against the government. Then appears the numismatic section with no one to counterfeit the Commonwealth version of the great seal of England, and this is followed by pages 355-7 with no counterfeiting the coinage of the Commonwealth, importing false money, no uttering or making payments with false money etc. And no one is to Impaire, diminish, falsifie, clip, wash, round or file, scale or lighten, for wicked lucre or gains sake any the proper moneys or coyness of this Commonwealth, or the dominions thereof, or of the moneys or coins of any other realm allowed or suffered to be currant within this Commonwealth. . .

The penalty for treason under the Act was death and forfeiture of all lands and goods.

As with all acts and ordinances passed by Parliament during the Civil War and the Interregnum, which did not have Royal Assent, this Act was made null and void following the Restoration of the monarchy in 1660.

hereas the Parliament hath Abolithed the Kingly Office in England and Ireland, and in the Dominions and Territories thereunto belonging; and having Resolved and Declared, That the People Chall for the future be Governed by its own

Representatives or National Dectings in Councel, Chosen and Entrusted by them for that purpose, Hathsetled the Government in the Way of a Commonwealth and Free-State, Without King or House of Lords: Be it Enacted by this present Parliament, and by the Authority of the same, That if any person shall maliciously or advisedly publish, by Writing, Printing, or openly Declaring, That the said Government is Cyranical, Usurped or Unlawful; or that the Commons in Parliament assembled are not the Supreme Authority of this Nation; or shall plot, contribe or endeabor to stir up, or raise force Ogq 9

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against the viesent Government, or for the subversion or alteration of the same, and shall declare the same by any open deed. That then every such Offence Chalt be taken, deemed and adjudged by authority of this Parliament to be High Treason. And whereas The Keepers of the Liberty of England, and the Councel of State, constituted, and to be from time to time constituted by Authority of Parliament, are to be under the faid Representatives in Parliament, Entrused for the Maintenance of the said Government, with se= veral Powers and Authorities limited, aiven and appointed unto them by the Parliament; Be it likewise Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if any person wall maliciously and advised= ip plot or endeavor the subversion of the said Keepers of the Liberty of England, 02 the Councel of State, and the same chall declare by any oven deed. or thall move any person or persons for the doing thereof, or the up the Beople to rife against them, or either of them, their or either of their Authorities. That then every such Offence and Offences, thall be taken, deemed and declared to be Diah Treason. And whereas the Parliament. for their full and lawful defence, bath railed and lebyed the Army and Forces now under the command of Thomas Lord Fairfax, and are at present necessitated, by reason of the manifold Distractions within this Commonwealth, and Invahong threatned from abroad, to continue the same, which under God, must be the Instrumental means of preferbing the Well-affected people of this Nation in peace and lafety: Be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That if any person, not being an Officer, Soldier or Member of the Army, hall plot, contribe

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trive or endeavor to this up any Dutiny in the faid Army, or withdraw any Soldiers or Offic cers from their obedience to their Superior Offi cers, or from the present Government as afores faid; or thall procure, invite, and or askist any Forraigners of Strangers to Invade England or Ireland; or Wall adhere to any Forces raised by the Enemies of the Parliament or Common-Wealth, 02 Keepers of the Liberty of England; 02 if any person thall counterfeit the Great-Seal of England, for the time being used and appointed by anthority of Parliament, That then every such Offence and Offences thall be taken, deemed and declared by authority of this Parliament, to be Digh Treason; and every such persons thall suffer pains of death, and also forfeit unto the Keepers of the Liberty of England, to and for the use of the Commonwealth, all and lingular his and their Lands, Tenements and Hereditainents, Goods and Chattels, as in case of high Treason hath been used by the Laws and Statutes of this Land to be forfeit and lost. Provided als ways, That no persons thall be indicted and Arraigned for any of the Offences mentioned in this Act, unless such Offenders thall be Indicts ed and profecuted for the same within one year after the Offence committed. And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid. That if any person chall counterfeit the Money of this Commonwealth, or thall bring any faile Mo= ney into this Land, counterfeit or other, like to the Boney of this Commonwealth, know= ing the Money to be falle, to Merchandize or make payment, in deceit of the People of this Pation; or if any person thall hereafter fally forge and counterfiet any such kinde of Coyn of

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of Gold or Silver, as is not the proper Copn of this Commonwealth, and is or Chall be currant within this Nation, by consent of the Parliament, or such as shall be by them authorized thereunto; or chall bring from the parts beyond the Seas into this Commonwealth. or into any the Dominions of the same, any fuch falle and counterfeit Coyn of Money, being current within the same as is above faid, knowing the same Money to be false and counterfeit, to the intent to utter or make pay= ment with the same within this Commons wealth, by Merchandize or otherwife; or if any verson chall Impair, Diminich, Falufe, Clip, wath, Round or file, Scale or Lighten, for wicked Lucre or Gains lake, any the proper Moneys or Corns of this Commonwealth. or the Dominions thereof, or of the Moneys or Corns of any other Realm, allowed and suffered to be current within this Common= wealth, or the Dominions thereof, That then all and every such Offences abovementioned. thall be and are hereby deemed and adjudged High Treason, and the Offenders therein, their councellors, procurers, appers and abet= toes, being convicted according to the Laws of this Nation of any of the laid Offences, thall be deemed and adjudged Traytois against this Commonwealth, and thall suffer and have such pains of Death, and Forfeitures as in case of High Treason is used and Dedained. vided always, and be it Enacted by the authority aforesaid, That this Act touching the Moneys and Coyns aforesaid, or any thing therein contained, not any Attainder of any person for the same, shall in any wife extend or be

(357) be judged to make any corruption of Blood, to any the Heir or Heirs of any such Offender, or to make the wife of any such Offender to lose or forfeit her Dower, of or in any Lands, Tene= ments or hereditaments, or her Title, Action or Interest in the same.
