## A New Bust Type for James I Shillings

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The silver coinage of James I was well written up over a century ago and the various busts appearing on the shillings illustrated by Morrieson in 1906<sup>(1)</sup> with more details of initial marks used for each coinage in 1907.<sup>(2)</sup> He followed this with a short article in 1912 with a short note describing recently confirmed and discovered silver varieties.<sup>(3)</sup> In 1912 Symonds reviewed the surviving Pyx records, which allows a good estimate of the rarity of some of the issues to be determined.<sup>(4)</sup>

Morrieson's listing forms the basis of all subsequent catalogues of the silver coinage of James I. With the exception of the relatively rare crowns, the topic remained quiet for about a century with just the odd die sinker's error and unrecorded overstruck initial marks appearing in print and in auctions. The crowns were studied in more detail by Francis in 1921-2<sup>(5)</sup> and a full die and die combination study was published by Cooper in 1970. (6)

Then in 2007, David Holt published an unrecorded transitional bust on a first coinage shilling with initial mark thistle (1603-4).<sup>(7)</sup> Four different obverse dies are now known that use this bust punch.

To this can now be added a new bust type for the second coinage shilling with initial mark key (1609-10). The portrait is shorter and much narrower, and the shoulder and collar are sparsely decorated when compared to the normal 5<sup>th</sup> bust. The crown is also narrower with fewer jewels on the upper arches. Both the new piece and the normal 5<sup>th</sup> bust are illustrated below for comparison.

Obv. **IACOBVS:D:G:MAG:BRIT:FRA: ET:HI:REX.** i.m. Key. 5<sup>th</sup> Bust.

Rev. **QVAE.DEVS.CONIVNXIT.NEMO. SEPARET** i.m. Key, around Royal shield.
