## Early Anglo-Saxon Coins - Keeping the Corpus Current

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Nearly all numismatic books are notoriously slow to sell. One approaches publication with trepidation, as breakeven slips below the horizon. It can rarely be seen as commercially viable but is a labour of love.

Most fields of numismatic research proceed with dignified grace, but attempting to keep abreast of new revelations of early Anglo-Saxon coinage has been a headlong rush. I had thought the pace had slackened since the third edition of *Sceatta List* (*SL*III) in 2021 but was disabused of such a complacent attitude when I recently overcame my enormous innate resistance to Facebook and joined, for the admittedly mercenary reason of promoting *Gold Coins of Anglo-Saxon England* (*GCASE*).

While that aim was largely unfulfilled, I was struck by the quantity of early Anglo-Saxon material on various Facebook groups – such as:

- Saxon Coins Sceats And Thrymsas
- English Hammered and Early Milled Coin Collectors
- Hammered Coinage Identification Group
- British Hammered & Milled Coins Buy, Sell & Auction
- Discussion of Modern Sceat Replicas

## My own website already had pages covering:

- additions to the corpus of gold, silver and Northumbrian base stycas, both new varieties and variants (i.e. sub-varieties), and
- images of specimens superior to those in GCASE, SLIII and Stycas Simplified, or otherwise noteworthy.

Encouraged by the quality of material on these Facebook sites, with the appropriate image use permissions and credits, and Ron Bude's help in removing image backgrounds, I now added a <u>Gallery of Choice Sceats</u>.

One must constantly bear in mind Stuart Rigold's dictum 'The most imponderable lines are those between the passably orthodox, the tolerated imitation, and the downright fraudulent', and guard against allowing variants to proliferate unnecessarily – these catalogues are not die studies - even though over time it becomes increasingly difficult to apply the same consistent frame of reference.

This is particularly true for the enormous Series E of the Low Countries. Had I applied the same rules to this coinage as to the English emissions, *Sceatta List* would have been twice as
