THE 1997 BALDWIN'S AUCTIONS PARCELS FROM A SCANDINAVIAN HOARD

The Baldwin firm offered in its auctions 13, 28 May 1997, and 14, 13-14 October 1997, two substantial parcels from a Viking-age coin hoard that had evidently been found in one of the Scandinavian countries¹. At this distance in time it is not necessary to debate the legalities involved in offering these coins at auction, but the catalogues for the two auction sales concerned provide an excellent illustrated record of the coins involved, as well as accurate identifications, helpful references to comparable specimens recorded in existing publications, and weights both in grains and in grammes.

No scholarly discussion of the content of these parcels has so far appeared in print, but the sensitiveness of the circumstances in which the hoard was discovered and of the process which led to these particular coins from it being sold by auction in London is less than it was a quarter of a century ago. Although the parcels from the hoard sold in London contained many coins struck for Danish rulers at Lund and elsewhere between the 1030s and the middle years of the eleventh century, the hoard's interest for students of the Anglo-Saxon series is that it had an Anglo-Saxon element that commenced with coins of Aethelred II, and included significant numbers of coins of Cnut, Harold I, Harthacnut, and Edward the Confessor². A summary list of the coins involved is given at the end of this note, but it is convenient at this point to give the headline totals for reign and type:

Aethelred II (35 coins): CRVX 4, Long Cross 14, Helmet 6, Last Small Cross 11

Cnut (238 coins): Quatrefoil 20, Pointed Helmet 103, Short Cross 115

Harold I (75 coins): Jewel Cross 39, Fleur de Lis 36

Harthacnut (30 coins): *Jewel Cross* 5 (2 in name of Cnut, 3 in name of Harthacnut), *Arm and Sceptre* 25 (19 in name of Cnut, 6 in name of Harthacnut)

Edward the Confessor (165 coins): Arm and Sceptre/PACX mule 1, PACX/Arm and Sceptre mule 1, PACX 28, Radiate Small Cross 62, Trefoil Quadrilateral 45, Trefoil Quadrilateral/Expanding Cross (Light phase) mule 1, Short Cross (otherwise Small Flan) 17, Expanding Cross (Light phase) 10

The absence of any coins of types subsequent to *Expanding Cross* suggests that the English element in the hoard will have terminated with coins struck early in the first half of the 1050s.

As it happens, all the *Expanding Cross* coins are of the Light phase of the type, struck to an intended weight standard of around 1.15g, rather than being of the Heavy phase of the type, struck to an intended weight standard of around 1.70g. The general picture for hoards containing Anglo-Saxon coins deposited after the middle of the eleventh century in the Scandinavian and Baltic regions is one in which Light coins of the *Expanding Cross* type are significantly more numerous than Heavy coins of the same type, but the fact that there seem to have been no Heavy coins at all in the present parcels from the hoard is an interesting one. It is indeed a potential piece of evidence that the Light phase of the type predates the Heavy phase of the type, but the arguments on this issue are complex, and this is not the place to embark on them.

A further group of late Anglo-Saxon coins likely to have incorporated coins from the hoard in question was offered as lots 1248 to 1337 in the Baldwin firm's auction 18 of 12-13 October 1998. The date profile of these coins was generally similar to that of the coins sold in 1997, but the group included a coin of Aethelred II's *First Hand* type, predating any of the coins of Aethelred II offered in May or October 1997, and its Edward the Confessor content included one coin of the Heavy phase of the *Expanding Cross* type, two coins of *Pointed Helmet* type, and one coin each of *Sovereign Eagles* type and of *Hammer Cross* type. If these latter coins were to have formed part of this hoard, the end date of the Anglo-Saxon portion of the hoard would have been some years later than is indicated by the composition of the parcels from it sold in the Baldwin auctions of 1997.

Fortunately, a catalogue note attached to the description of the coin of Aethelred II's *First Hand* type, London, moneyer Godwine, lot 1251 in the sale, records that this had formed part of lot 101 in the Glendining sale of 5 October 1943 of the collection formed by C.A.Whitton, and it may reasonably be presumed that the presence among the coins offered in October 1998 both of it and of coins of Edward the Confessor of later types unrepresented among the coins sold in 1997 was an attempt to disguise the fact that the rest of the coins then offered derived from this Viking-age coin hoard from a Scandinavian country, of which the dispersal was by then under active investigation by the authorities. If this was the intention, it failed to work, for all the coins in lots 1248 to 1337 were, for whatever reason, withdrawn from sale before the auction took place. Any future publication devoted to the hoard as a whole will have to take account of the coins in these lots, but it will be for a future scholar to demonstrate for certain that all of them, except presumably the coins referred to in the preceding paragraph, belong to this particular hoard.

Here is the list of the coins sold at auction in May and October 1997. The numbers that occur in it are the numbers of the lots in which the coins featured, in a sequence between 1524 and 1720 in the catalogue for the May sale, and in a sequence between 149 and 311 in the catalogue for the October sale. Although this is not indicated in the October sale catalogue, a number of the coins offered in May were unsold on the day, and reoffered in October, and I have taken the opportunity to record where this was

the case³. Coins illustrated in the respective catalogues are identified by an accompanying asterisk.

As is the case with most hoards containing coins of the later Anglo-Saxon period found in the Scandinavian countries, no particular regional bias is discernible within the hoard's detailed content, other than the significant representation of coins struck by London moneyers among those of Cnut's *Pointed Helmet* type (45 coins out of 103).
